Background

Established in 2002, NCEF has raised more than US \$90,000 and awarded a total of 222 annual scholarships in Bhaktapur, Dolakha, Kathmandu, Kavre, Maneswara, Mustang, Nepalgunj, Palpa, Patan, , Rasuwa, Sindhupalchok.

NCEF identifies children unable to pursue education because of economic situation of their families. Students are provided with tuition, textbooks and supplies to enroll in school. Our dedicated network of volunteers in Nepal meets regularly with the children and their parents to monitor the progress of the student through school. We dedicate our resources to each child until they complete their high school education (grade 12).

Synopsis

Nepal

Set in the Himalayas between India and China, Nepal is home to 26 million people. The 2002 UN Human Development Report ranked Nepal number 142 out of 173 nations, indicating a strong need for development in health, the economy, and education.

Government

Nepal is coping with a changing political climate after the civil conflict which has destabilised education infrastructure and system resulting in a decrease in school enrollment. In this time of nation rebuilding, NGO like NCEF has a crucial role to play by providing opportunities to students who had never had an opportunity to go to school or had experienced disruption in education because of displacement or orphanhood because of the conflict.

Development

One of the poorest countries in the world, Nepal's GDP per capita was approximately \$1100 in 2007. Nepal has about 48% adult literacy, and 60% child literacy. The education outlook has shown a promising trend over the last twenty years, but there is still a great deal of work to be done.
